


John D. Ackerman and his wife Lurania Churchill, daughter of Winslow Churchill

Lake Ellyn










The first baseball game was played at Lake Ellyn




The first train station in Glen Ellyn



A newer train station around 1901




The first locomotive to steam into Glen Ellyn


